

- Alaska Department of Education & Early Development responsibilities:
 - Support public education system for students, grades PK-12
- Summary of Alaska's Secondary Schools:
 - 294 schools serve grades 9-12
 - of those, 213 schools are K-12
 - 44 are comprehensive high schools
 - 3 are magnet CTE high schools
 - 1 is a state-run boarding high school
 - High school enrollment ranges from under 10 to over 2,000

Workforce Investments



By investing in Workforce Development, the State of Alaska seeks to align the education, job-training, and employment opportunities that will help individuals succeed in the workplace and provide a qualified workforce to help employers achieve business success and growth. The State of Alaska's portfolio of investments in Alaska's Talent Pipelline for FY15 is provided below.

ALASKA CONSTRUCTION ACADEMIES

Created in 2006 with industry professionals, for construction and apprenticeship programs

Trainees: 8,119

Invested: \$3,330,000

ALASKA OIL AND GAS TRAINING FUND

Alaska's oil and gas industry impacts more than 45,000 workers, annual earnings of billions. We help Alaskans prepare to fulfil the jobs and needs of the industry.

Trainees: 162 Invested: \$161,316

COMPASS ALASKA PROGRAM

Structured career exploration, support services, and work experience for Alaska's youth ages 16 - 24 designed to lead to long-term career objectives and defined post-secondary training or education.

Grants will be awarded in September

CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION

Alaska's CTE promotes and strengthens career and technical education for workforce development in Alaska via collaboration, innovation and networking.

Trainees: 1,957 Invested: \$615,000

STATE TRAINING AND EDUCATION PROGRAM

The STEP trains for Alaska's high demand industries, improves the quality of the workforce by training Alaskans, and makes it easier for employers, employees and job seekers to access job training. STEP is training more than 3,200 Alaska for the construction industry, 218 for oil and gas and resource extraction, 75 for health care, and more than 100 in other industries.

Trainees: 3,600 Invested: \$4,487,173

TECHNICAL VOCATIONAL EDUCATION PROGRAM

Legislatively-designated funding for rural training centers and University of Alaska Workforce Programs to provide industry specific training, onthe-job training, and classroom linked job training. Refer to each facility for details about the training programs offered through the TVEP funding.





Dear Alaskans:

An ancient proverb advises: if you want 100 years of prosperity, grow people. That is the shared mission of the Department of Education & Early Development, the Department of Labor and Workforce Development, and the University of Alaska - to grow people ready for the workforce, ready to contribute to our state, and ready to provide a future for themselves and their families.

In 2010, we published the Alaska Career and Technical Education (CTE) Plan. Since that time, we have continued to advocate for and support the re-establishment of career and technical education into the mainstream education system. Implementation of the plan has resulted in alignment of funding and programming to increase CTE offerings throughout the education and workforce development systems in Alaska.

The Alaska State Legislature and the Parnell Administration have supported these efforts by funding the Career and Technical Education grant program to expand secondary curriculum, reauthorizing the Technical Vocational and Education Program to fund postsecondary training, adding the voc-ed increment to the K-12 foundation formula, and including a CTE option as part of the Alaska Performance Scholarship program.

The strategies in the CTE plan remain relevant as guidelines to help strengthen our state's CTE system. As we renew our support for the plan, we are committed to continue working together toward the ongoing expansion of career and technical education and training in our state. Along with the ongoing recommendations from the CTE Plan Advisory Committee, our action agends will focus on increased alignment with employer demand, workforce development plans, and in-demand occupations. By even closer collaboration with our partners in education and workforce development, we can provide more pathways that lead to occupational credentials and degrees for Alaska's current and future workforce.

For Alaska's continued prosperity, an educated, work-ready workforce is essential. Achieving that goal requires the ongoing partnership and contributions of elected leaders, school boards, employers, educators, students, and you. Join us as we build Alaska's Talent Pipeline.


